

The new Student Handbook will be available in August. Until then, the following information is offered to enable planning for the upcoming year. Please plan to review the Dress Code section of the new Handbook when you receive it.

Clothing and Equipment

All dormitory rooms are equipped with basic furniture, including a bed and mattress (extra-long length), a pillow, desk and chair, and a bureau. Students should bring all bed linen (unless using the Laundry Service), blankets, a good desk lamp, a heavy-duty extension cord, and items such as bedspreads, rugs, etc. according to personal taste. Some dorms have curtains or shades; you may wish to buy curtains after registration or discuss room furnishings with your roommate.

Every student should have an alarm clock. Radios and other audio and video equipment may be used except during times for studying and sleeping. Headphones are strongly recommended. Video game systems and movie projectors are not allowed in dorm rooms. Many students enjoy the use of bicycles; a Kryptonite U-lock or equivalent is essential. Students should have a knife, fork, spoon, plate, glass or cup for use outside the dining room (from which no items may be taken).

Phone lines are available in all rooms, but telephones are not furnished by the school. Cell phones may be used in the dorm except during study hall time.

The school expects students (and parents) to be able to judge basic clothing needs. While the dress code is essentially "neat and clean," more formal dresses and coats & ties are needed for special events and trips.

Students should arrive for registration prepared for the orientation week in the White Mountains. See the enclosed equipment list.

Heavy clothing (usually wool and/or down), boots and gloves are needed for winter wear. Students accustomed to warmer climates may wish to purchase winter clothing during the fall term so better judgement may be used in choosing appropriately.

All clothes should be plainly marked with the student's name.
